#### Birch Class Y6 - Miss Egan: The House with Chicken Legs by Sophie Anderson


This is an enchanting story based on the East European folklore character of Baba Yaga, but not as the terrible witch-like creature you may have heard of before.






## Hazel Class Y4 - Mrs Waddington: Tin by Pádraig Kenny

Filled with challenging vocabulary I would highly recommend this book for confident readers in Year 4 and upwards!


Chestnut Class Y4 - Miss Sykes: A Poem for Every Day of the Year chosen by Gaby Morgan



Have you ever been worried about not being able to draw? Well I certainly have!





#### Elm Class Year 1 – Miss Heron: <u>Boogie Bear by David Walliams</u>



### Cherry Class Reception - Miss Revely The Wonky Donkey by Craig Smith


Want to read a book that will make you all giggly-wiggly? Want to get all tied up with rhyming tongue twisters? Then this is the book for you!
